2014 FJAS Competition

For the 2013–2014 school year, ten chapters renewed their affiliation with a total of 322 members. There were also 17 individual members for a total of 339 members. Of these 158 students submitted papers to the preliminary competition. Eighty students were initially invited to present at the 2014 competition. When cancellations were received an additional 8 students were invited to present based on their scores from the judges of the preliminary competition. Once again many students did not follow the guidelines for submitting their papers which may have prevented their papers being selected. The most common problems that caused students to lose points were:

Generic attachment name (FJAS paper is not appropriate, use key words of the paper title) Student's name, school, or mentor's name appears in the paper or in attachment file name Papers exceeded the 2MB size – these were sent back to be corrected, but delayed acceptance Many judges and myself have limits on our inbox and large files were not always accepted.

Discussion of Funding Dominated the Business Meeting

Jamie Odzer of Dr. Michael M. Krop, who won the scholarship, shared her experiences at AJAS with the other students who attended. In addition they thanked Ms Gordinier of Pine Crest who acted as the chaperon. The highlights of the conference that is held in conjunction with the American Association for the Advancement of Science include the two presentations: one similar to FJAS and the other, a poster presentation for AAAS. In addition to touring local facilities the students enjoyed a breakfast with scientists. All of the students shared that AJAS is a wonderful opportunity. Last September, Ms Zalo requested a donation from Florida Academy of Sciences to help fund the trip when she realized that the current funding could not cover the costs for this trip. FAS did award FJAS \$1000 with the expectation that FJAS would increase the dues and registration fees to make FJAS more sustainable. Students who place as a high school junior can apply for the scholarship.

After hearing from the students who attended the American Junior Academy of Sciences we discussed the options for continuing to offer the AJAS scholarship for one student and a chaperone to attend this annual event. Dr. Charles Gordon of American Heritage made a motion to increase the rates for membership and registration as listed below which was approved by everyone present at the meeting.

Chapter affiliation fee - \$40 – (this pays for 2 late members who want to submit papers)

Membership for each student in a chapter paying the affiliation fee - \$10

Individual membership - \$20

Web membership - \$15 (these students receive only one mailing)

Late memberships (received after December 31st) – double the normal rates listed above

Registration at the FJAS annual competition - \$5 for each student attending the meeting

During the Business Meeting American Heritage was elected as the Presidential Chapter and Pine Crest as the Vice Presidential Chapter for the 2014-2015 school year.
